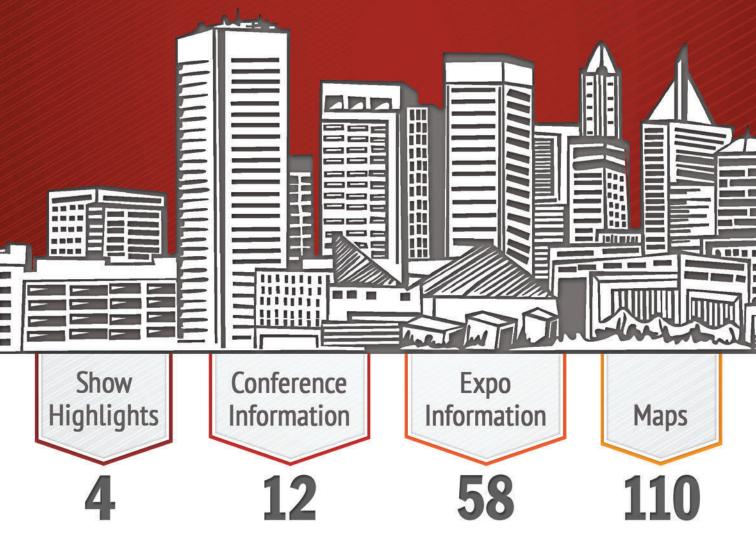

Recent changes in the composition of floor finishes and concrete floor construction practices have significantly increased the number of moisture-related floor finish failures. Repair of floor finish failures are typically very costly, time consuming, and disruptive to operation. Why Benchmark for Failure?

How do we compare to our peers has become a common question directed to facility managers. To answer this question, facility mangers typically use published benchmarking data in an attempt to draw some comparison with spending and staffing applied to various variables. In many cases the data collected to generate benchmarks is not standard across the participants because the facilities environment does not have a standard for capturing and reporting information. This can result in understating or overstating benchmarks without digging deeper into the parameters and variables associated with the data. More importantly if you are comparing with your peers, the economy of your industry, or the locations of the benchmark peers may provide answers that are less than adequate to ensure your stewardship role. In the worst case scenario, an outside consultant has been brought in to benchmark all staffing and costs for the organization and they are using benchmark criteria that does not really relate directly to facilities. This typically results in answers that can often leave the facility manager in a very defensive mode.
