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

# Your Building's Energy Bill Increases 5 Percent Per Year. What Can You Do About It?

Presenter(s): Davor Novosel, Chief Technology Officer, National Energy Management Institute Committee (NEMIC) The Energy Systems Laboratory of the Texas A&M University conducts retro-commissioning on buildings worldwide. It found that energy savings decline about 3% to 5% per year, with a wide spread on actual efficiency losses. Assuming a 10% per year loss in energy efficiency, your high performing, i.e., 50% better than ASHRAE/IESNA Standard 90.1 baseline, building will be at minimum level within six years. This presentation will highlight reasons why building performance deteriorates over time. To counter the degradation requires continuing maintenance and services of testing, adjusting and balancing (TAB) professionals.
